

In response to growing concerns by the public and health experts regarding the environmental impacts of health care, we have begun to research environmental sustainability among our partners. In November 2021, we surveyed our partners to get a better understanding of the ways in which our partners are currently perceiving and addressing environmental sustainability. 
However, it also became apparent that there are barriers to progress, including time, money, and lack of expertise/knowledge. We hope to help overcome barriers and promote environmental sustainability with four concrete recommendations:

- 1) Perform baseline audits of current sustainability practices;
- 2) Embed sustainability within Quality Improvement accountability framework;
- 3) Collaborate both externally and internally; and
- 4) Build capacity through education and funding.

In an effort to support our partners with these recommendations, we will begin with recommendations 3 and 4.

To help build capacity for this work (recommendation 4), our September 20th, Building Community Health Event, will be centered around bringing together our partners to discuss sustainability and to share our bold vision for the future of healthcare, recounting the progress of the past year, sharing lessons learned and growing together as a network. We are excited to welcome Dr. Soren Brothers, Inaugural Allan and Helaine Shiff Curator of Climate Change at the Royal Ontario Museum in Toronto, as our keynote speaker.
