The GHHN is fortunate to have local leaders like Dr. Meghan Davis, Dr. Brian McKenna, and Dr. Myles Sergeant leading environmental initiatives in healthcare who shared their experience and provided insight into how we can collectively make a difference.





Environmental Sustainability in the GHHN Report

In response to growing concerns by the public and health experts regarding the environmental impacts of healthcare, the GHHN has launched a Community of Practice and begun research to explore environmental sustainability in healthcare among our partners. By analyzing the ways in which our partners are currently perceiving and addressing environmental sustainability, and supporting these efforts, we can ensure both patient and planetary health. 2022 HEALTH EQUITY HIGHLIGHTS



Health Equity Council Formed

The GHHN Health Equity Council had their first official meeting on January 28th, 2022 with a diverse membership of 21 representatives from frontline workers to organizational leads.



Data, Equity & Justice Webinar

Hosted a webinar on Data, Equity & Justice: Respecting Relationships for Health Equity on March 25, 2022 with over 100 people in attendance.



Equity Data Working Groups

The collection of equity data for the purpose of addressing systemic racism and oppression is a key component of the GHHN Health Equity Framework. The GHHN Equity Data Working Group is a collaboration between volunteers from the GHHN Health Equity Council and representatives from partner organizations to oversee development of the equity data tool.





Equity Data tool piloted at Women's Health Days

GHHN is actively developing a data tool to be used by partner organizations to assist in the safe and ethical collection of equity data. The tool is currently being piloted at Women's Health Day events with the purpose of soliciting feedback from participants to better understand the needs of equity-seeking populations served, as well as use the data collected to guide initiatives that address systemic racism and oppression.

eQUITY-Link French Language Health Services Pilot Project

In collaboration with Entité 2, the GHHN has invited partner organizations to assess their ability to provide French Language Health Services (FLHS) using the eQUITY-Link platform. Upon completion of the assessment, members of the cohort are supported and given next steps to increase their capacity for FLHS, regardless of their current level of provision.



Positive Space

Experienced providers of services to the 2SLGBTQ+ community are developing a handbook to assist partner organizations in their development of Positive Spaces. A key component mentioned by this priority population in the GHHN Health Equity Framework is the importance of the 2SLGBTQ+ community to access care in environments that demonstrably keep them safe from harassment, violence, and discrimination.

PRIORITY POPULATIONS

The GHHN works with partners across Hamilton, Haldimand, and Niagara Northwest with a focus on priority populations including:

- Congregate Care (Long Term Care Advisory and Residential Care Facility work)
- Mental Health and Addictions (MHA)
- Women, trans, and gender diverse people experiencing homelessness.

Living healthy in our community and aging in place are main priorities for the GHHN. Creating a system of support in our congregate settings is more important than ever.

2022 PRIORITY POPULATION HIGHLIGHTS



GHHN LTC Advisory

There is a need for a more fundamentally integrated care framework that places residents and staff at the centre of a progressive, inclusive, and evidence-informed system of care. The GHHN LTC Advisory is a dedicated group of clinicians, administrators, and community leaders working to establish this new regional framework for LTC within the GHHN.

Formed the LTC Innovation Network

The Long Term Care Innovation Network was formed to provide informative and inspiring topics, supportive tools, success stories, and programs/tips to better align legislation. The target audience for the network includes 36 LTCs. This includes the Palliative Care Approach Strategy work.







LEAP LTC Training

LEAP LTC Training through Pallium Canada in partnership with Division of Palliative Care, provided training on November 21-22, 2022 to 18 LTC staff from some of the 36 LTCs in our area. A second training is planned for early 2023.



Mental Health and Addictions Secretariat

To tackle each priority area, working groups will be established. In summer 2022 the Harm Reduction and Safe Supply Working Group (HRSSWG) was established to tackle priority 1: access to care for people with an opiate addiction. The HRSSWG is the GHHN's first group to be co-chaired by a system lead (Dr. Robin Lennox, St. Joeseph's Healthcare Hamilton) and a person with lived experience (Marcie McIlveen, HAMSMaRT). The HRSSWG has developed an action plan for 2022-23, including mapping existing harm reduction services and developing educational opportunities to increase capacity within primary care and high-risk settings.

LEGHO Program

The GHHN LEGHO program will be an extension of an existing pathway developed by the imbedded integrated/multidisciplinary discharge team in the Hospital Emergency Departments. These teams conduct comprehensive patient assessments with the goal of avoiding hospital admissions. Home and Community Care Support Services (HCCSS) Care Coordinators are an integral part of this team. LEGHO will offer a new and/or complimentary discharge option for those who meet eligibility requirements.



To date Women's Health Days has served almost 400 women, trans and gender diverse individuals over the course of 6 events since 2021, with the leadership and support of more than 25 partners and collaborators, and 50 providers per event.

PRIORITY POPULATIONS



RCF Pilot

At the two pilot RCF sites- (not directly related to RCF Steering Committee)

- Increased connection to primary care, community connector, HCCSS coordinator, Hospital to Home St Joseph's Healthcare Hamilton, and other supports to increase preventative care, mental health and addictions, chronic disease management
- Dialectical Behaviour Therapy (DBT) delivered to residents onsite over 8 week, positive feedback, to resume again this quarter



RCF Research

HiREB (Hamilton Integrated Research Board) approved the "Understanding the Population Health Needs of Residential Care Facility (RCF) Tenants in Hamilton, Ontario" was conducted at 5 pilot RCFs in Hamilton on 2022.



Trauma Informed Care Training

Provided trauma informed care training for over 15 frontline staff from residential care facilities (RCF) across Hamilton. This training is part of the work of the Residential Care Facility Steering Committee's to support evidence based integrated care.

Women's Health Review

PRIMARY CARE

Through the Primary Care Secretariat several projects began in 2022, the first being the development of a formal Primary Care Network (PCN). Currently the GHHN has an informal PCN through HFAM (Hamilton Family Medicine). HFAM helps bring a unified voice to primary care and works towards ensuring all primary care providers, regardless of their affiliation (i.e., FHO, FHT, CHC, FFS, FHG, etc.), are connected and have a safe space to share their experiences and receive support. As pressures and demands continue in primary care, a formal PCN will begin considering how the system can collaborate to expand team-based care and improve equitable access, create a single-entry point for unattached patients, and enhance integration of primary care within the larger health care system, particularly home care, mental health, and social services.

2022 PRIMARY CARE HIGHLIGHTS



Primary Care Stakeholder Council (PCSC)

This year the PCSC focused on governance and reporting structure, including its mission and purpose: to represent the interests of the primary care community, including providers and patients, and set strategic direction for the primary care community.



HFAM

Through HFAM, the GHHN's informal PCN, the primary care community has been regularly engaged and updated on COVID-19 and associated pathways, health pathways for palliative care, COPD, and additional local mental health resources. HFAM hosts monthly Town Halls with over 600 primary care providers invited to share information, resources, and better understand the needs of our primary care community.



Patient Care Mapping

A Primary Care Mapping project was requested to gain a more accurate and complete understanding of the current primary care workforce and capacity. This project has requested information from the CPSO to map practices and providers to identify underserved areas and support planning of a PCN that is equitable and accessible.



Eva Rothwell Centre Primary Health Care Collaborative (ERCPHCC)

This project is our first example of how a PCN can be utilized to improve access to primary care services in underserved areas. The ERCPHCC will be a team-based primary care hub operating out of the Eva Rothwell Centre in the North End of Hamilton to serve those in this 'Code Red' neighbourhood. The ERCPHCC project will rely on primary care and social service partners to collaborate and share resources to fund staff and programming. Ground will break on the construction of the ERCPHCC in 2023.



The GHHN Medical Assistance in Dying (MAiD) Steering Committee is made up of individuals from GHHN member organizations, and patient advisor(s) to provide oversight and planning for activities related to MAiD in the GHHN region.

The GHHN hosted a public event with over 50 attendees that focussed on Assisted Dying in Canada in October, and were pleased to be joined by a national expert and leader in this field, Dr. Stefanie Green, the President of the Canadian Association of MAiD Assessors and Providers. Dr. Green provided a public talk, as well as offering readings from her book, This is Assisted Dying – documenting her personal story of empowering individuals at the end of life, and chronicling her own experience of becoming involved in this important work. The GHHN also hosted a Grand Rounds for over 120 health care professionals with Dr. Green in early November to support building local capacity.

GOVERNANCE

The GHHN is the first Ontario Health Team to develop an equity focused not-for-profit governance structure that reflects the high level of collaboration needed to transform healthcare. The GHHN has shared their governance work across the province, and recently the Ontario government announced in their Path Forward document that all OHTs will be required to become a not-for-profit incorporation. We are grateful for the local leadership and support on our governance journey.

First OHT to incorporate

Board of Directors

The GHHN formalized a Board of Directors, and will be adding a complement of directors in 2023.



Sharing our work

The GHHN presented their governance work at the International Foundation for Integrated Care Canada on a virtual international stage. The GHHN has presented, met with, and shared their governance work with Ontario Health Teams across the province.





Our Partners

The GHHN has incorporated an extensive list of partners that span health, housing, and social care into their working groups, secretariats, and the board. Our work is based on collective decision making with our partners, patients, families and carepartners to co-design healthcare transformation.



Direct Reporting

The GHHN has four key stakeholder councils set up with a direct reporting relationship to Board. This includes the Haldimand Stakeholder Council, Primary Care, Health Equity Council and the Patient, Family, CarePartner Leadership Network.

In August 2022, Haldimand stakeholders started convening as the Haldimand Stakeholder Council (HSC). A fully integrated table that includes representatives from across Haldimand and has representation on the GHHN Board of Directors and allowing the HSC to feed directly into the GHHN Board of Directors.

Since full integration between the teams, key activities have taken place to support the planning, implementation and operationalization of the integration.

Data Working Group

A data working group was developed to analyze and recommend Haldimand specific initiatives to support population health management.



Communications Plan

A communications plan was developed for the Haldimand Stakeholder Council as part of GHHN regular communications, as well as nuanced and tailored communications activities to meet the unique needs of our Haldimand stakeholders.



Integration work

As Haldimand and the GHHN work to become integrated as one OHT, Haldimand stakeholders are actively participating on the Governance and Nominating Committee of the Board, as well as all other working groups and committees of the GHHN, including the Patient Engagement and Primary Care Engagement Councils.
